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

A Community Prospers With the Help of MAMA!

As you travel the dirt roads in the mountainous regions of Honduras, you pass through small, quaint villages. You may pass by groups of people relaxing in a hammock beside the road, men returning from their days of tending their crops in the fields, women washing their laundry in the river. It looks beautiful all around you. However, there is much that you do not see. You do not see the children that have died from sicknesses that can easily be prevented. You do not see the homes with very little food to provide for their families. You do not see the worry in the parents as they desire to provide the best for their families but do not have the means to do so.

It's communities like these where MAMA Project works. MAMA provides help to about 80 villages around the Nutrition Center in the

departments of Yoro, Comoyagua, Cortes, and Santa Barbara. Many times a leader from the community will hear about MAMA and the work that we do and contact our office to set up a visit.

The community leaders represent the needs of the community and find help for them when they are able. The community leaders that work with MAMA participate in the Child Survival Training, learning how to care for their community and encourage good hygiene and health.

For the last three years, MAMA has been working in a community named Lomas Pelonas in Yoro, Honduras. This community is about two and a half hours from the Nutrition Center. The distance to the village prevents MAMA teams from going more than once a year. The leader in Lomas Pelonas is named Aleyda Reyes. Aleyda lives with her husband, Jose, and her four children, ages 18, 12, 9, and 2. Aleyda was born and raised in the community and then moved elsewhere to find work in a factory for about 12 years before returning in 1999. Upon returning to Lomas Pelonas, Aleyda became a volunteer at a health clinic in Santa Lucia and continued that work for 7 years.

Aleyda saw the need for her community to get better health care. The nearest health center (where she volunteered in Santa Lucia) was 13 kilometers from the village. Villagers go there to receive their prenatal care and any other health care needed. While Aleyda volunteered

in Santa Lucia, she would take the knowledge that she learned, and share it with her community.

Aleyda prayed that someone would find her community and come help them, knowing that her community was far away from the main towns. In 2009 Aleyda was talking with a woman at her church and she began sharing about how MAMA Project had come to help provide medical care to her community.

In 2011, MAMA brought the first mission team to Lomas Pelonas. The community, although small, needed help, as Aleyda had witnessed. The overall health of the community was poor. Every year MAMA has been able to send a team back to Lomas Pelonas to continue helping the people.

Aleyda says that since MAMA has been involved, her community has improved in health understanding and overall health. For example, before, most of the people in the community had parasites and the deworming program that MAMA provides has helped their burden with intestinal parasites a lot. Aleyda said that MAMA has been an answer to prayers and she is very thankful, happy and proud of what MAMA has done for her people.

With help from MAMA's supporters like you, we can continue working in villages like Loma Pelonas, where we can provide medical care and education for the people to improve their health.


While talking with Aleyda about her community and the work that she does for the people, she often quoted from Psalm 91.

hand towel, washcloth, comb, nail clipper, toothbrush, toothpaste, band-aids.

Please include \$5/kit to cover shipping costs.

Other: children's clothes & shoes, small toys (stuffed animals, cars/trucks or dolls), reading glasses, hair-ties/headbands, work gloves, baseball caps

Please include \$20/box to cover shipping costs.
